## How West Virginia Stands to Benefit from the Great American Outdoors Act


## What the Great American Outdoors Act Does:

- The Great American Outdoors Act <u>provides \$900 million per year</u> in permanent funding for programs funded by the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF).
- Since its creation in 1964, LWCF has provided over \$250 million to West Virginia, having benefited 54 of 55 counties
- ♦ For the last several years, funding for the LWCF has been under \$450 million
- LWCF funding is used for programs that create more access to places to hunt, fish, and shoot; programs that increase opportunities for outdoor recreation; and programs that ensure timber will be continuously harvested from working forests
- LWCF has funded projects as diverse as securing river access in the Gauley River National Recreation Area and constructing a public gathering space (now known as Discovery Junction) in Marlinton, WV
- The Great American Outdoors Act <u>also provides \$9.5 billion in funding for deferred maintenance projects</u> on Federal lands, such as National Parks and National Forests.
- This funding would come from Federal energy development projects, energy development (primarily oil and gas leasing) within onshore Federal lands or offshore Federal waters
- National Parks would receive 70%; National Forests 15%; and National Wildlife Refuges, Bureau of Land Management lands, and Indian schools—5% each
- In West Virginia, National Parks have accumulated \$63.4 million in deferred maintenance; the Monongahela National Forest has \$48.6 million; and the Fish and Wildlife Service has \$6.7 million
- This includes crumbling roads and bridges, outdated wastewater and electrical systems and deteriorating monuments
- Last year, 1.66 million visitors enjoyed units of the National Park Service in West Virginia, spending \$75.4 million in the surrounding communities according to the 2019 National Park Visitor Spending Effects report

## Impact to the U.S and West Virginia Economies:

- Two studies have been published that project the nationwide economic impact of the Great American Outdoors Act:
- A Boston University study indicates that the LWCF portion of the bill would support <u>an additional 15,000 28,000</u> jobs.
- A study commissioned by Pew Charitable Trusts indicates that addressing the deferred maintenance backlog of the National Parks could generate nearly <u>110,000 additional infrastructure-related jobs</u>.
- According to the Bureau of Economic Analysis, the outdoor recreation industry in West Virginia generates 22,202 jobs; provides \$668.5 million in salaries; and contributes \$1.498 billion in economic output each year.

Senator Manchin managed the Great American Outdoors Act on the Senate Floor on behalf of Democrats, which resulted in the bipartisan bill **passing in the Senate with a vote of 73-25**.
